# SEN Information for Parents and Carers

Here at Bratton Primary School, we wish to help you understand what Special Education Needs and/or Disabilities (SEND) means.

SEND can affect a child's ability to learn and can affect a child's:

- behaviour or ability to socialise
- reading and writing
- ability to understand things
- concentration levels
- physical needs or impairments

If you think your child may have special educational needs, contact the 'SEN co-ordinator', or 'SENCo'. At our school, this is Mrs Laura Gullen.

About 1 in 5 children are likely to have special educational needs of some kind at some time during their school career. Some children may have special educational needs for a relatively short time; others may have special needs throughout their schooling. Some may have special needs in particular curriculum areas, but others may need help with all, or most aspects of their education. A small minority may have complex needs which may need a statutory assessment.

If your child has Special Educational Needs, then their education provision can take many different forms. It could include group or individual work, or a personalised learning programme adapted to meet a child's specific needs. Children and young people and their parents or carers will be fully involved in decisions about their education provision.

The Department for Education introduced a new SEND Code of Practice, in 2014. It explains the duties of schools to provide:

- reasonable adjustments for children and young people with SEN.
- auxiliary aids and services to disabled children and young people

The Code applies to all schools, Primary, Secondary or Special, and sets out a more co-ordinated approach to accessing services for children and young people which involves parents and carers, children and young people in the decision making process. Part of the Code of Practice is that all counties have to provide a 'Local Offer' of provision for Children and Young People with SEND and that all schools also have to provide a SEND Information Report accessible from their website.

The website has lots of information on the Local Offer. It provides information and guidance on services for children and young people, aged 0-25, with Special Educational Needs and/or Disabilities (SEND). It contains information about education, health, social care, preparing for adulthood and leisure. The Local Offer website also gives information on support for you as a parent / carer, understanding what SEND means for you and your family.

As previously stated all schools have to publish information for parents on what provision is available for children with SEND. This is called the SEND information report and is available on the school's website. A hard copy is also available from the school office. The SEND information report tells you as a parent/carer everything you need to know about what the school can offer children with special educational needs and/or disabilities.

### What are Individual Education Plans (IEP)?

An IEP sets out targets that will address a child's individual needs, based on the early identification of SEN. This will be written by the class teacher and will be shared with the parents and the child. The IEP will be reviewed at least three times per year.. The targets on the IEP must be 'SMART' (Smart, Measurable, Achievable, Realistic and within an appropriate Time frame

### What are My Support Plans?

These are holistic plans that are put together with your child, yourself and school staff which detail what your child's needs are and the extra help or interventions in place to support your child's learning. If your child has the support of an outside agency, such as a speech and language therapist or educational psychologist, a My Support Plan is usually put in place to pull together the outcomes to focus on.

### What is an Education, Health and Care Plan?

In Wiltshire, these are called My Plans. These are designed to replace Statements. If your child has a My Support Plan, information from this will be used to produce a My Plan. All the information held by you, your child's school, health and other professionals involved with you and your child will be in one form, which will be reviewed at least annually. You and your child will also be allocated a SEND Lead Worker, who will coordinate this plan.

Both the My Support Plans and My Plans are very child focussed, this means that your child will have a say in their learning and care. What they feel works best for them their feelings, thoughts, and wishes are put into the plans.
